From the Principal's Desk

Hello Everyone,

It was wonderful this morning to see how many students dressed up to demonstrate what they wanted to be when they grew up. Welcome to our Preservice teachers Bree and Caitlin! They are undertaking a most unusual experience, working with their mentor teachers (who they have met in person) in an online environment with students they may not meet in person! They will be with Newham Primary until the end of this term. Look out for them in the sessions and say hello!

Just before Remote Learning #2 Newham received a grant towards plants from the Plant Nursery Association. Our order has now been placed and we expect to see the plants arrive in time for the school holidays. We will plant for spring and make a lovely vision in the gardens for returning students.

Don't forget that there is a Family fun night next Tuesday – it's all around sounds!!! This could be a true test of knowledge! Get out your thinking caps and see you all there.

A reminder that Friday Sept 11^{th} is a Curriculum Day- No students can be on-site at school on that day.

The Minister for Education, James Merlino was on television recently, stating that schools will be back in Term 4, however it was unclear if he meant only Melbourne or was including Regional schools in stage 3. Premier Andrews, had originally stated that remote learning would be reviewed on the 13th September, with perhaps an expectation that schools would return quickly. No further information has come from DET to clarify when we will actually be returning to school. Therefore staff at Newham will be planning for remote learning to continue right up to the September School holidays (Friday 18th September). It is best to be prepared for all contingencies. I will inform you as soon as a return date has been confirmed.

David Howes, Deputy Secretary, Schools and Regional Services, has been talking over the past couple of weeks about perceptions of our students' educational experience in Victoria in 2020. He spoke of a narrative that could take hold over the year that 'students have lost a year of learning'. This semester we will be focusing and assessing our students' abilities in their personal and social capabilities. This is their ability to self-regulate and manage their own learning appropriately for their stage of development. It is their ability to use all the resources provided by the teacher to improve their pieces, practise new skills and refine the work they are producing. It is their ability to revise, edit and check their pieces of work without prompting or expecting their teacher/parent to edit for them.

It is also their ability to use the modelled example, the success criteria or rubric that outlines 'what a good one looks like' to evaluate their own work and how they can improve it before submitting to the teacher.

There are a variety of styles of delivering remote learning across the state. Some schools are providing hard copy work and no online face to face contact at all for a variety of reasons. Other schools (especially secondary) have a virtual classroom for each of their teachers/subject areas so that students are online with their whole class for 2-3 hours per day or more. We are very aware that our students do not have remotely, the same amount of explicit teaching as they would face to face in their classrooms. Therefore staff are building a share bank of videos to overcome this. However, we are hoping to see some fantastic gains in their agency and independence which will serve them well throughout their life of learning. David Howes also touched upon parental concerns over this state wide variation in remote learning delivery, where parents from Melbourne schools in particular, have broached the idea of their child repeating a year level. Currently this is not on the DET agenda. David emphasised the importance in these unprecedented times of keeping the class cohort together.





Junior Unit










Senior Unit


